What is M*A*S*H?

M*A*S*H refers to clinics in which equipment is brought to a public building, such as a gymnasium or armory, and set up in order to hold spay neuter clinics in a remote or underserved community.

M*A*S*H programs enable services to be provided in a location in which it would be cost prohibitive, or simply impossible, to establish a permanent clinic and in which flexible services, such as multiple veterinarians, may be needed.

By relying on a building which is "borrowed," local volunteers, and volunteers' vans or pick-up trucks for transport if needed, M*A*S*H clinics are absolutely the most cost effective model there is. M*A*S*H is also very labor intensive.

The number of surgeries depends on the surgeon (or surgeons) and the volunteers who monitor recovery tables, wash instruments, etc. Any program which brings temporary services to a community must have a way to provide aftercare if post surgical complications arise. Aftercare is typically handled by a contract with a local veterinarian.

However, because M*A*S*H requires a temporary space and several volunteers, there are limitations; it may be impossible to expand the number of days or the overall program as needed.

If more services are needed, it may be time to partner with others to develop a more comprehensive, permanent or widespread service.
